## BULLETS END LIFE OF FIGHTING NEGRO

Scott's Bullets Stopped Writer Of Letters To White Woman

Four bullets from the pistol of City Marshal Jim T. Scott put an abrupt end to the life of Jimmy Wade, 36-year-old negro, Sunday evening. The negro had turned from an assault on Mr. Scott's companion to fight with the law enforcement officer.

The negro's death followed his accusation by the two men. Mr. Scott and his companion had charged him with the authorship of letters to a white woman living near Covington. The letters had suggested the woman meet Wade for a date.

Several of the letters were in Mr. Scott's possession at the time the men confronted the negro. The latest of them was dated June 27 and included instructions to the woman for getting in touch with the negro.

Mr. Scott stated in a hearing before Judge R. H. Erwin Wednesday afternoon that he had observed the man going to the place he had told the woman to leave a note for him. Finding no note, the negro stayed in the immediate vicinity for several hours.
